During this time of year we have a perfect example of people ignoring facts (truths) and choosing to do what they want to do. In the past numerous newspaper articles have been written that clearly point out the origins of many of the customs and traditions that are prevalent at this time of year. Many customs are clearly understood as coming from non-Christian religions and sources; but, such information usually falls on deaf ears. Many people simply do not care.

It is interesting to witness the writings of various scholars and historians who (in an attempt to support certain traditional concepts) choose to either ignore or reason around facts that are verifiable.

For example, we know that December 25 is not the true date of Jesus Christ's birth. The Bible nowhere even alludes to the date of Jesus' birth let alone clearly gives one. All we can conclude is a general time period in "midish" fall. This guess depends on a number of speculations (guesses) concerning the conception of John the Baptist which would require more space than we have here to address that point.

However, one point we can clearly conclude is that Jesus was not born December 25 in the "dead of winter".

This fact historians can't deny but try to. The historian Philip Schaff is one of these who try to reason around the facts. The following is a quote from "History of the Christian Church" by Philip Schaff, Volume 1, Apostolic Christianity, A.D. 1-100, page 127.

"The only indication of the season of our Saviour's birth is the fact that the Shepherds were watching their flocks in the field at that time, Luke 2:8. This fact points to any other season rather than winter, and is therefore not favorable to the traditional date, though not conclusive against it. The time of pasturing in Palestine (which has but two seasons, the dry and the wet, or summer and winter) begins according to the Talmudists, in March, and lasts till November, when the herds are brought in from the fields, and kept under shelter till the close of February."

The quote is historical fact. Schaff added this comment to the historical fact "though not conclusive against it." Schaff wanted to support the traditional December 25 date so he tried to insert the idea that the Talmudists words were not the definitive statement on the subject. The Talmudists record that sheep would not be kept in the fields at that time of year, December 25. At that time of year the grass is dead and the sheep would be brought in from the fields and fed until the spring grasses grew again. Schaff does not want to accept this fact.

Schaff, like many people, wishes to believe his own ideas even when facts or truth reveal those ideas to be false. This is at the heart of false religion.
