

From the Pastor:

As James begin leading toward the close of this letter to the scattered brethren (James 1:1), he touches on several different subjects and gives words of advice for each. James 5:13 gives two such bits of instruction. “Is anyone among you suffering? Let him pray. Is anyone cheerful? Let him sing psalms.”

The first exhortation is for those who are suffering. The Greek word translated “suffering” is kakopatheo. Kakopatheo is a verb and is used only four times in the New Testament. In the KJV it is translated as 1) endure hardness [2 timothy 2:3] 2) suffer trouble [2 Timothy 2:9] 3) endure affliction [2 Timothy 4:5] 4) be afflicted [James 5:13]. (This material all comes from the Online Bible Greek Lexicon - OBGL) Danker’s Lexicon defines kakopatheo as to “suffer misfortune” or to “bear hardship.”

The noun form of kakopatheo is kakopatheia and means “the suffering of evil, i.e. trouble, distress, affliction.” (OBGL). Danker’s defines the noun as simply “suffering.” The noun is only used once in scripture in James 5:10 where James wrote, “My brethren, take the prophets, who spoke in the name of the Lord, as an example of suffering [kakopatheia] and patience.”

James is giving instructions on what to do in the face of some adversity or trial. He says that if we are facing adversity we should pray. Those are simple words, but far too many people do not grasp the vital truth in that statement. That simple instruction (pray) will only have real meaning for us if God and His promises are real. God has given a number of promises that we can claim in the face of adversity or trials. The following are just two of God’s promises.

Roman 8:28 records, “And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to His purpose.” This is a powerful promise. But, in order for us to claim that promise in faith, we must have a heart that is committed to loving God.


1 Corinthians 10:13, “No temptation has overtaken you except such as is common to man; but God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted beyond what you are able, but with the temptation will also make the way of escape, that you may be able to bear it.” If we know God is with us, no trial will overwhelm us. And, we know that as long as we don’t forget to love God, all will turn out for good. These are powerful promises.

The second instruction is one that most people do anyway. “Is anyone cheerful? [Greek – euthumeo – OBGL – verb – “to put in good spirits] Let him sing psalms.” Many when they are happy can be found humming or singing softly to themselves. James obviously encouraged that conduct.

So at the end of his letter James gives instructions on how to face trials and what to do when cheerful. This reflects his words at the beginning of the letter. James 1:2-3, “My brethren, count it all joy when you fall into various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces patience.
