We will be camping in individual campsites in the wooded area of the park. **To reserve a campsite please contact Arnold Mendez Sr directly. He has pre-reserved a group of campsites and he will assign you a site.** This area has restrooms with showers. Each individual campsite has a picnic table, water, electricity, fire ring, and BBQ grill.

Directions: The park is located 10 miles northeast of Rockport on State Highway 35 to Park Road 13, then 2 miles east to park entrance.

Activities: The shoreline is comprised of concrete bulkhead, oyster shell, mud flat, and marsh grass. The main recreational activities are camping, excellent birding, and fishing (the park participates in the "Loan A Tackle Program" and lends out fishing tackle to visitors.) No fishing license is required to fish from state park property. Other activities include picnicking, biking, boating (motors allowed), hiking, washer/corn hole games, volleyball, astronomy, nature study, wildlife observation, and photography.

Fishing: Fish from shore, boat, or the 1,620-foot long fishing pier. There is a regular boat launch (bring your own boat). There is a fish cleaning station near the pier.

The "Big Tree" located nearby was named State Champion Coastal Live Oak (*Quercus virginiana*) in 1969, is thought to be one of the largest in the nation. Estimated to be over 1000 years old, the "Big Tree" has a circumference of 35 feet, is 44 feet in length and has a crown spread of 90 feet.
